- A) Just War Theory (Read the Paper: *The Christian Perspective on War: The Activist Position*)
  - 1. What are the three God-ordained purposes of human government in the Old Testament?
  - 2. What does Romans 13 add to our understanding of God's purposes of government?
  - 3. Explain Matthew 5:39 in its context? Does this passage preclude self-defense, either personal or national?
  - 4. What criteria does Just War Theory before a nation should go to war? For conduct in war?
  - 5. What was the rationale for the United States to use nuclear weapons on Hiroshima & Nagasaki?
  - 6. What was the rationale for the M.A.D. (Mutually Assured Destruction) of the Cold War?
  - 7. What are the dangers of having nuclear weapons? Of not having nuclear weapons?
- B) Read the paper: Will the Real Peacemakers Please Lay Down their Lives?
  - 1. What is pacifism?
  - 2. Can the principles of personal pacifism be projected into a national stance of pacifism? Why or why not?
  - 3. Can specific instances of either war or peace in the Old Testament be properly used to justify a stance of either war or peace in a present circumstance? Why or why not? What can be learned from those specific examples?
  - 4. Do the various commands to love (limitless love section VI, A in the paper)- preclude self-defense? Why or why not?
  - 5. What is the pacifist explanation for the many wars recorded in the Old Testament many of which were at God's direction?
  - 6. Explain Matthew 10:34 in its context
  - 7. Explain Matthew 26:52 in its context
  - 8. Explain Luke 22:36 in its context
  - 9. Why did Jesus refrain from armed self-defense and revenge during His years of earthly ministry? How did Jesus show He had full power to control the events of His arrest and crucifixion?

- 10. How will Jesus respond to His enemies in the future?
- 11. Why did the apostles refrain from armed self-defense and revenge during their years of ministry? What are some examples of apostles being protected or taking action to protect themselves?
- 12. Does a personal position of pacifism require a pacifist position in the protection of others? Explain
- 13. What are some of the logical fallacies presented in the paper, *Will the Real Peacemakers Please Lay Down their Lives?*
- 14. What was the reason the paper, *Will the Real Peacemakers Please Lay Down their Lives?* Begins and ends with personal stories from war? Do either of those stories validate the pacifist position either personally or nationally? Explain.
- 15. In a time of war, what obligations does a pacifist citizen have toward his nation? Explain.

## Case Studies

- 1) You are a Christian who has been personally assaulted while witnessing at an outreach event. What are your options in responding? What factors will help you determine what you should do?
- 2) You are a citizen of a nation that had entered into war with another nation. What difference would the following factors help you determine your response to that war?
  - A) There is a formal declaration of war. There is not a formal declaration of war.
  - B) Your nation is the aggressor nation. Your nation is responding to defensively
  - C) You have been drafted into military service
- 3) You are a parent and your child is being physically threatened at a public event. What are your options in responding?
- 4) You stop by to see your aging parents and discover when you go inside that an intruder is physically assaulting them. What are your options in responding?
- 5) You are serving as a legislator in the governing body of your nation and a bill comes up concerning appropriations for the nation's nuclear weapons arsenal. What factors would help you determine whether such a bill should be supported or opposed?
- 6) You are serving as President of your nation. The neighboring nation has just made a military raid into your nation leaving several citizens dead. What factors will help you determine your response?
